UNFPA IN 2004:
PROGRAMME AND FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS¹

Pledges and contributions

- Regular income in 2004 totalled \$331.6 million, an increase of 13.4 per cent compared to the 2003 income of \$292.3 million. This includes \$322.5 million in voluntary contributions, \$3.5 million in interest income, and other income of \$5.6 million.
- Pledges to UNFPA regular resources in 2004 totalled \$322.5 million from donor Governments and a private contribution from the Mars Trust. This is \$34.0 million, or 11.8 per cent, more than the \$288.5 million pledged in 2003. At year's end, cumulative pledges through 2004 totalled about \$6.1 billion from a cumulative total of 191 donors. The number of donor Governments in 2004 totalled 166. Also, as mentioned above, there was a contribution from the Mars Trust.
- Contributions to other resources of \$171.4 million were provided through trust funds (\$94.5 million), cost-sharing programme arrangements (\$36.6 million), and other arrangements (\$40.3 million). The contribution of \$171.4 million is an increase of approximately 65.4 per cent compared to \$103.6 million in 2003. Interest and other income of \$3.1 million bring to \$174.5 million the total income for other resources for 2004.
- Total regular and other income in 2004 was \$506.1 million.

Expenditures

- Programme expenditures in 2004 totalled \$221.9 million, as compared to \$176.4 million in 2003. The 2004 figure includes \$181.6 million for country programmes, compared to \$140.5 million in 2003; and \$40.3 million for intercountry (regional and interregional) programmes, compared to \$35.9 million for 2003. It should be noted that costs for administrative and operational services (AOS) are now included in programme expenditure. The comparatives reported in this document have not been re-stated. Restatement would have resulted in an increase of \$5.0 million in total programme expenditures for 2003. AOS costs included in the 2004 figures amount to \$6.4 million.
- Technical support services under the successor support cost arrangements approved by the Governing Council in decision 91/37 were \$19.4 million.
- For expenditures in 2004 by programme areas, by geographical area, and by country category, see data on pages 4-11. In decision 2004/7, the Executive Board approved the multi-year funding framework (MYFF) 2004-2007, which focuses on the three results areas of reproductive health, population and development, and gender as key requirements for poverty eradication. It should be noted that information pertaining to the programme areas for 2004 is not directly comparable to information for 2003, due to certain differences in the programme areas for the 2000-2003 MYFF and the 2004-2007 MYFF.

Country categories

- Executive Board decision 96/15 endorsed the procedure for allocating resources according to categorization of countries into groups, and decision 2000/19 updated the relative shares of resources to groups as follows: Group A, 67-69 per cent; Group B, 19-21 per cent; Group C, 7-9 per cent; countries with economies in transition, on a temporary basis, 3-4 per cent; and other countries and territories, 1.5 per cent.² (For a list of countries by group, see page 12).
- The breakdown of resources expended for country programmes and projects in 2004, by group, is as follows: Group A, 66.7 per cent; Group B, 19.0 per cent; Group C, 8.6 per cent; countries with economies in transition, 4.3 per cent; and other countries and territories, 1.3 per cent.
- Total expenditures in 2004 for Group A countries (which include all least developed countries) amounted to \$121.1 million, compared to \$92.1 million in expenditures in 2003.

Intercountry activities

- Expenditures for intercountry activities (regional and interregional) totalled \$40.3 million in 2004, compared to \$35.9 million in 2003. By category of activity, these expenditures were: regional, \$12.2 million in 2004, compared to \$12.7 million in 2003; interregional, \$28.1 million in 2004, compared to \$23.2 million in 2003.
- Intercountry programmes accounted for 18.2 per cent of total programme expenditures in 2004, compared to 20.3 per cent in 2003.

Biennial support budget

- The net expenditure for the biennial support budget for 2004 is approximately \$70.3 million, representing 21.2 per cent of regular resources and 13.9 per cent of total resources income.

Personnel

- As of 1 January 2004, the total number of authorized budget posts numbered 972, comprising 439 Professional (including 225 national programme officers) and 533 General Service staff. These include 113 Professional and 108 General Service posts at headquarters, 2 Professional and 1 General Service posts in Geneva and 324 Professional and 424 local General Service posts in the field.
- The percentage of women among UNFPA Professional staff at headquarters and in the field was 47 per cent in 2004, one of the highest percentages among United Nations agencies and organizations. Moreover, 8 of the 14 members of the Fund's Executive Committee are women.

² It should be noted that effective January 2005, in accordance with Executive Board decision 2005/13 on a review of the system for the allocation of UNFPA resources to country programmes, countries with economies in transition have been mainstreamed. In decision 2005/13, the Board endorsed the procedure for categorizing countries into Groups A, B and C as outlined in the report DP/FPA/2005/6 and approved the relative share of resources presented in table 4 of the aforementioned report.
