







Lessons learned snapshot		
1	Power sharing	Be intentional in re-balancing power relations to allow for meaningful participation
2	Space	Create space for young people to engage
3	Diversity	Inclusive, transparent selection enhances the diversity of youth in evaluation
4	Clarity	Clarity on the purpose of youth engagement sets realistic expectations
5	Integration	Integration of young people throughout the evaluation process enhances their contributions
6	Learning	Dedicated space for learning supports youth role and engagement in evaluation
7	Empowerment	Meaningful engagement builds capacities and empowers youth

This experience also delivers on the Evaluation Office's commitment to the <u>Youth in</u> <u>Evaluation manifesto</u> and upholds the <u>Youth in Evaluation standards</u>, key tools developed and advocated by the <u>Eval4Action</u> campaign to advance meaningful youth engagement in evaluation.
