Note by the Executive Director

Summary

The present note contains information on the one-year extension of the UNFPA country programme for Bhutan.

In accordance with established procedures, the Executive Director approves the first one-year extension of a country programme, while requests for second one-year extensions or requests for two-year extensions are submitted to the Executive Board for approval.

The Executive Board may wish to take note of the one-year country programme extension for Bhutan, as indicated in table 1.

Since UNFPA is one of the organizations participating in the “delivering as one” programme in Bhutan, the UNFPA country programme has also been extended for one year, through the end of 2013.</p>	<p>The Government is leading the development of a joint cooperation strategy in line with the principles of the Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness and the Accra Agenda for Action. The strategy will provide a common platform of development cooperation between the Government and its development partners. The joint cooperation strategy, which the United Nations and the development partners support, seeks to better align development assistance to the current national five-year development plan (2009-2013) and the subsequent eleventh five-year plan (2014-2018).</p>	<p>The current country programme provides an adequate framework for all UNFPA-supported projects being implemented in Bhutan.</p>
